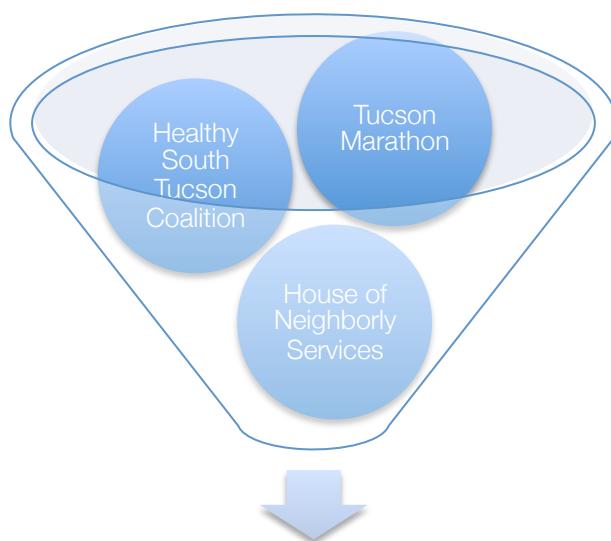

### Example of Synergistic Effect of Partnerships:



We concentrated our promotion efforts to schools and community-based organizations in lower-income neighborhoods. In 2013, **the two highest recruitment sources, comprising 45% of the total youth participants, were from areas with more children in poverty than Tucson’s average.**
